NEW YEAR BRINGS HOPE FOR THE FUTURE

The Reading the Past, Writing the Future Campaign ended 2016 with so much to be grateful for. The highlight, of course, was the completion of the Reading Porch. Everyone on the campaign committee is absolutely delighted that we were able to put our donors' money to work and complete such an important piece of the overall puzzle. On behalf of all of us working on the campaign – thank you so much to all who gave and we hope you are as pleased as we were to dedicate the Reading Porch to the memory of Faity and Ben Tuttle.

“The Tuttle family has been extraordinarily generous and intricately intertwined with the Kinderhook Memorial Library for so many years, and to remember our honorary Campaign Chair and her beloved

husband in this way just seems so right and fitting,” said Board President Gary Spielmann.

As we move into 2017, we continue our march to raise highly needed funds for the major addition. We are hoping to raise an additional \$750,000 in commitments from individuals, families, and businesses during this calendar year, which would enable us, if we are also successful in tapping into some state funding, to potentially break ground on the next stage of construction in 2018.

Once again, the Friends of the Kinderhook Memorial Library has stepped up to the plate and led the effort off with a generous contribution of \$8,000. Our Friends group is exemplary in so many ways, giving time, talent, and hard-earned treasure to support the Library both programmatically and with the capital campaign.



To achieve our goal we need you. If you have not yet made a multi-year pledge (you may pledge for up to five years), we urge you to meet with one of our campaign committee members to discuss a commitment that will be right for you. Creating a family commitment around a naming opportunity (e.g. Computer Workstations, Seating Areas, the Young




Computer Classes



Having a library card means you can have 24-hour access, 7 days a week to the collections of 66 libraries in the Mid-Hudson Library System. Just fill out this form and bring to the library with some form of identification and proof of local residency such as:

- A driver's license or photo ID
- An envelope or postcard recently mailed to your street address
- A utility bill that lists your street address

The minute you have your card in hand you have access to nearly 2.5 million items that you can request online. You also get HomeACCESS which links you to current magazine, newspaper and journal articles from your home, school, or office. HomeACCESS includes the New York State Online Virtual Electronic Library (NOVEL) databases. To use HomeACCESS, visit the library's website (kinderhooklibrary.org), click on Online Research, enter the 14-digit barcode from your library card—and you're in!
